Relief Amid Shutdown

Perhaps everything is not lost for the government workers impacted by the federal shutdown. Common Energy, which sells clean energy electricity supply to utility customers in New York, says it will pay the electric bills of federal employees in upstate New York impacted by the shutdown for two months. After that, Common Energy says it can provide a 10 percent discount to government employees in a deal that can be renewed for up to 20 years. "We are pleased to offer some relief to impacted government employees," Richard Keiser, CEO of Common Energy, said.

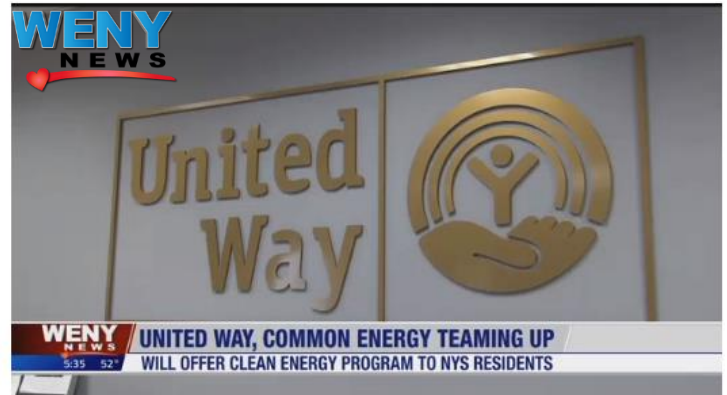
Common Energy to pay government worker electricity bills

ALBANY, N.Y. (NEWS10) - Common Energy announced it will offer relief to government employees affected by the federal government shutdown by paying their electricity bills for up to two months.

According to CEO of Common Energy Richard Keiser, "Government employees will benefit in three ways: immediate relief for outstanding electricity bills, long-term savings through a contracted discount to their electric utility, and immediate environmental impact by reducing carbon emissions."

COMMUNITY-FOCUSED SOLAR FACILITY OPENS IN OPPENHEIM

Common Energy Vice President of Partnerships Malcolm Bliss explained to attendees that what makes the 1.94 megawatt project different than others in the region is that it is specifically generating energy for residents and local businesses. Those who sign up to purchase energy from the facility, which operates under NYSERDA's community shared solar program, will receive a 10 percent discount on their energy bill from National Grid. "We brought this to the people of Oppenheim, and it's up to them now to come to us — it's a great advantage to those who sign up," Town Supervisor, Breh said. "Renewable energy is good for the country, good for the air, and is a win-win all around."

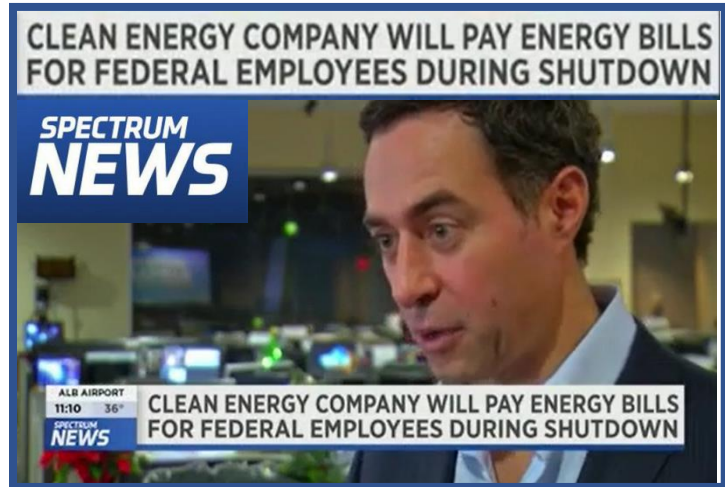
